It is amazing how time flies. It seems that only yesterday we were closing the San Antonio reunion. Now we move on to the next reunion in Orlando on September 6-10. There are many attractions in the Orlando area. Plan extra time before or after the reunion to take advantage of these activities.

Blackhorse Medal of Honor – Corporal Jerry Wickam

Cince starting Operation Fargo in the Dmiddle of December 1967, Second Squadron Troopers had been looking for the enemy around Loc Ninh. But the recon troops and tank company just couldn't seem to pin the enemy down. There had been plenty of mines, RPG teams, and sniper fire, but nothing substantial. The Hotel Company commander, CPT Don Saari, recalls that "we had contact on a daily basis", but these did not develop into major contacts. The intel specialists kept saying that there were at least three regiments of the 9th (VC) Division out there - somewhere. But day after day, in unrelenting heat and choking dust, the sweeps kept coming up empty.

On the 5th of January 1968, Echo Troop was the latest to move through an area that looked promising; it turned out to be another dry hole. The area was near a small village near the Cambodian border. But the Battle Squadron com-

mander, LTC Garland McSpadden, was determined. He knew there was something in there; his gut feeling was confirmed by the results of an airborne radio direction finding flight that same day. So he told his operations officer to work up a plan for the whole squadron to search the same area the following day.

As part of the commemoration, each of the more than 58,000 names listed on the Wall will be read by volunteers over a four day period. It's an honor to be a volunteer and help read names. Greetings to the Troopers of the Best Damn Regiment. Our Regiment has just returned from Holiday leave and we are eager to get back to the business of training U.S. Army Brigade Combat Teams.

The Regiment completed the 20th Annual Long Walk to the Barstow Veterans Home, December 13th, where our troopers shared stories with veterans of each of the armed services. Our visit this year to the veteran's home was special, as this is the 20th year that the Blackhorse Regiment has conducted this tradition, which also marks how long the veteran's home has been in operation.

Our partnership with this great organization will continue to grow as we pass along the stories and history from one generation to the next.

The Regiment is now preparing to conduct Rotation 17-03, when the National Training Center will host 1st Stryker Brigade Combat Team, 25th Infantry Division out of Fort Wainwright, Alaska. Random Recognition

Part of our common cultural coin is the story of the Red Badge of Courage. Many of us read the book in grade school, some may have seen the movie, but all of us know the story. In the book, the Red Badge is the blood staining a soldier's uniform proving that he overcame fear and faced the enemy and death head on. Today that badge is the Purple Heart.

Many a Blackhorse veteran wears that pin or hat — or limps. But the Military Order of the Purple Heart members were not the only ones to stand tall, move forward and face the enemy. An even greater number of veterans of Vietnam and Cambodia, and younger lads from Desert Storm and Iraqi Freedom Operation served and moved forward to face the enemy head on and were mercifully spared. Not all. We have a list on the back of our calendars of the more than 700 brave men who were not spared.

We believe, as least I do, that besides those troopers that wear the Purple Heart or those troopers who paid the ultimate price there are still thousands of other Blackhorse veterans who proudly wear the red badge of courage. And we do. Our badge is the red and white shield backlighting a rearing black horse on our regimental patch.

Like Purple Heart recipients, the Blackhorse patch is a nationally recognized badge of honor. You have all experienced that recognition. I am willing to bet that you have experienced someone stopping you and saying — Blackhorse! Many will also say: "you saved our [derriere]." Damn Straight!

Walking the streets of Warsaw's old city on a trip to Poland last year, I heard a shout from a block away. Another Vietnam veterans ran across to embrace me because I was wearing a jacket with the Blackhorse emblem. He was from Connecticut and not of our regiment but he revered the 11th Cav. Here in Virginia, at our church, a retired artillery officer with a limp and purple heart greets me every week because the Blackhorse saved

him (already wounded) and his battery in Vietnam.

I know I benefit more than once a week because of your courage.

You guys have made me feel patriotically proud so often, even when I have to confess that I wasn't behind a turret firing a .50 caliber machine gun or flying a Cobra or busting jungle with a tank. But I sure am proud that I was a Blackhorse chaplain.

God rest Bill Gregory. I always look forward to his piece in *Thunder Run* that urges us to show our pride; and I enjoy seeing cars and trucks, barns and garages, mail boxes and flag poles festooned with the Blackhorse patch.

On trips to Washington to participate with our veterans of the 11th Armored Cavalry at wreath laying ceremonies, I feel good walking across the Memorial Bridge or onto the hallowed grounds of Arlington Cemetery wearing my Blackhorse jacket or hat and being greeted with deference and admiration. As a chaplain I should be a lot more humble, but how can I be, being a trooper of such a proud and renowned regiment.

Wear your Blackhorse emblems with pride. You know you'll be excited when someone shouts out: "Blackhorse." It seems I meet someone who either served in the 11th Cav or someone who knows the Blackhorse label as well as a Yuengling label every week. I still get goose bumps when active duty troopers come to our gatherings in Washington or to our reunions wearing spurs and Cavalry hats and saluting us older veterans of a war gone-by. I make sure that when I attend a funeral of a veteran sor some civic function, meeting or parade that I proudly sport my Blackhorse insignia and am not surprised when a stranger approaches and says: "Blackhorse".

I'll not forget my first year at Fort Knox and serving as the Armor School Chaplain while General George Patton, III, was the Armor School commandant. He had a certain gruffness about him that masked a caring heart. He even asked me as I was about to leave for Vietnam: "what unit will you report to, Chaplain?". Not being a dummy, and noting the Blackhorse regimental patch on his shoulder, I stood up smartly and said: "hopefully your regiment sir, the 11th Cav."

When I arrived in Bien Hoa at o-darkthirty (under rocket fire), we were quickly assigned bunkers. A few hours later an officer walks into the bunker with a manifest in hand and calls my name and two other returning troopers. He said "grab your gear and hurry up, a chopper is waiting to take you to Phu Loi and the 11th Cav."

As Leroy Jethro Gibbs often says: "I don't believe in coincidences." ALLONS!



Membership is Our Strength



It's not the price you pay to belong, it's the price you paid to become eligible to join Team Hotel (one tank platoon and two recon platoons) was selected to lead the 2/11 advance on the 6th. The team's mission was to move down an old French colonial outpost trail in the direction of the Cambodian border. This was the area – based on the previous day's radio intercept – that held the suspected enemy base camp. CPT Saari decided to let his organic tank platoon (three M-48s) lead the column. He placed his own and the first sergeant's tanks behind the lead platoon, followed by the platoons of ACAVs from Fox and Golf Troops.

First Lieutenant Ed Jones' 1st Platoon, Fox Troop was cross-attached with Hotel Company for the mission. Eight of the platoon's ACAVs were operational on 6 January. Two scout ACAVs led the platoon, followed by the LT in his ACAV (F-16). CPL Jerry Wickam was the track commander (TC) of ACAV F-10 immediately behind the platoon leader.

About three-quarters of an hour into the mission, the second M-48 in the column was hit by an RPG-7 just as it entered a large clearing. The enemy gunner's aim was true; the rocket entered the turret on the left side – just below where the loader was standing. He was killed instantly as the warhead penetrated the turret and sent shrapnel bouncing around inside. The TC was severely wounded (but survived). The undamaged tanks immediately returned fire, as LT Jones' ACAV crews visually searched the tall grass. The RPG team was, however, long gone.

The contact ensured that everyone was alert and looking for bad guys left and right as they moved out again. Past the clearing, the vegetation grew right up to the edge of the trail. Visibility was cut to no more than 10-15 feet, giving the enemy a decided advantage; they were experts at camouflage. Nonetheless, the lead tank crew spotted another enemy position about 200 meters further down the trail. A sharp-eyed Trooper saw movement in one of the small bunkers that were located along the trail's edge. First Sergeant Macon Haynes directed his driver to crush the bunker with his 50-plus ton tank, which he proceeded to do.

CPT Saari herringboned his M-48s on the trail and told LT Jones to dismount some scouts to check out the area to the north. CPL Wickam dismounted, then said to SP4 Charles Henry: "Let's go Henry,

let's go check out this bunker."" They found an enemy soldier who had been killed apparently trying to exit the bunker. They pulled his body from the hole. That's when they heard, in Charles Henry's words, "a popping sound and a sound like a fuze burning". Jerry Wickam recognized it as the sound of a Chinese grenade being charged. Someone was still alive inside the bunker. Jerry yelled "Get back Henry, he just pulled a grenade" and pushed his buddy out of the way. He threw his own body across the entrance just as the grenade went off. Fortunately, neither Trooper was wounded by shrapnel, but the same could not be said of the enemy soldier. He unwittingly committed 'grenadacide'.

About the same time, a side gunner on F-12 noticed a second bunker on the south side of the road. He fired a magazine's worth of M-16 ammo into the hole. Jerry Wickam came running and added another clip's worth from about six feet away. LT Jones and SSG Don Carter dismounted and ioined them on the ground. Jerry pulled one body out, only to discover a second enemy soldier playing possum inside. As SSG Carter covered him with his pistol, Wickam pulled the enemy soldier - an assistant RPG gunner from the 2nd Battalion, 88th (NVA) Regiment - out of the hole by his collar and made sure he wasn't armed. They found an RPG launcher and four live rounds inside the position; these would never be used against a Blackhorse tank or ACAV.

Just at that moment, Ed Jones remembers, "all hell broke loose". The tanks and ACAVs came under intense automatic weapons, RPG, and 75mm recoilless rifle fire from the left (south). The response was instantaneous; 90mm canister, caliber .50, and M-60 machine guns blasted the jungle in all directions.

About this same time, the air support CPT Saari had requested arrived. Four F-4s

dropped their bombs and napalm into the jungle, followed by a flight of Huey gunships, miniguns blazing. Artillery was next, although it hit so far in the jungle that it could not be seen, only heard. The jungle was so thick that even the accompanying Zippo could not burn off enough foliage to see what was hidden amongst all that green.

The Blackhorse Troopers had stirred up a hornet's nest, and CPT Saari wanted to see what else was in there. LT Jones organized a 14-man dismounted patrol, with CPL Wickam volunteering to take the lead. Jerry's father had taught him to hunt deer and pheasant while he was growing up in rural Illinois, so he knew what he was doing. He wasn't about to let someone without the right skills be on point. For SP4 Phillip Parrish, who served with Wickam for five months, this was typical for Jerry. "He always was looking out for other people, to see that everyone was alright. He always took the most dangerous missions to protect his men."

As they moved deeper into the jungle, they found numerous empty spider holes and fighting positions. Soon, however, the trees and vines and underbrush grew so thick that visibility was cut to a foot or two. Moving in a crouch with weapons at the ready, the dismounted Troopers advanced cautiously. The patrol came under small arms fire and went to ground. LT Jones moved forward to be next to his pointman.

Jerry's eyesight was better than most in the jungle, despite the thick black-framed Army glasses he wore. He was the first to spot the two-man bunker about ten meters away. He pulled the pin on a grenade and let it fly into the entrance of the hole. LT Jones recalls counting the seconds, hoping that the enemy wouldn't throw the grenade back at them. They didn't. After the explosion, Jerry Wickam and Don Carter rose to charge the position. They immediately came under heavy and effective AK-47 rifle fire. Jerry Wickam was hit in the side, grunted, and fell to the ground. Don Carter rushed to his aid. His Silver Star citation relates: "Although only a few meters from the enemy positions, Sergeant Carter gallantly gave first aid to the dying man and began to pull him back to safety through heavy automatic and semi-automatic weapons fire. While engaged in his mission of mercy, Sergeant Carter was hit four times by sniper fire and seriously wounded."

Other members of the platoon were able to rescue SSG Carter, but for Jerry Wickam it was too late. The medic tried mouth-to-mouth resuscitation, but he was already dead.

Shortly after his death, MAJ Don Martin, the Second Squadron Executive Officer, began the process for the award of the Medal of Honor to Jerry Wickam. He interviewed some of the Troopers who had fought alongside him. Many years later, MAJ Martin reflected on what he learned.

My only knowledge of Corporal Wickam had come through hearing his fellow soldiers speak of his behavior on that fateful day. I can still hear the inspiration in their voices as they described his courage and leadership... I don't know what went through Corporal Wickam's mind as he faced a determined, well-armed enemy manning camouflaged bunkers only a few meters in front of him. I do know that he ran the race of a soldier with honor, leading the assault on bunker after bunker, even when severely wounded, until he collapsed on the field of battle... I do know that he exhibited at that moment of crisis the utmost faithfulness to his comrades-inarms, to his unit and to his country.

When she was in Washington to receive Jerry's posthumous Medal of Honor from Vice President Agnew on 18 November 1969, his widow, Suzanne Wickam, was quoted as saying that "even if the war came to an end today, I still would not feel that Jerry had died in vain. He believed in what he was fighting for, and that's all that matters." She explained further that after Basic and AIT, Jerry was sent to Germany. The couple was childless at that point, but they both wanted to raise a family. "He asked God to give us a son", Suzanne told a reporter, "and he made a promise that he'd volunteer for Vietnam if the prayer was answered... I was for it. I knew how much it meant to him. He couldn't have lived with himself if he hadn't gone."" Four months into his Germany tour, their prayers were answered, and Jerry was true to his pledge. He volunteered for duty in Vietnam.

John Maville said of his best friend and high school classmate: "'Jerry had what few young people have today, discipline and responsibility."

Amen, brother!

Combat The Dog

Blackhorse legend has it that an unknown Trooper from Headquarters and Headquarters Troop, Regiment, smuggled a dog aboard the USNS Sultan before it departed Oakland Terminal for the long voyage to Vietnam in August 1966. The dog's name was Combat. He earned his name by extending his tour of duty in the war zone six times.

Combat first came to the attention of the 'authorities' when he showed up in the Long Binh Staging Area in early September – just after the Boat People had arrived. He became well-known to the veterinarians attached to the 37th Medical Company, as well as to the HHT Mess Daddy. Allen Hathaway recalls: "He was a little black and white dog except for his legs which were red from the clay dirt. Combat liked to hang around the field kitchen begging for handouts. Of course this gave the cooks and medics fits because of sanitation concerns. (Yeah, right, sanitation. LOL!)"

Over the course of the next four and one-half years, Combat earned campaign credit in War Zones C and D, the Iron Triangle, Gia Ray, Claymore Corners, the Catcher's Mitt, the Michelin Plantation, Thunder Road, and Cambodia. Combat moved where the Troopers moved – to the new Blackhorse Base Camp, Quan Loi, Di An, and Bien Hoa. He rode on jeeps, ACAVs, and command post vehicles. From Junction City to Tet '68 to Montana Raider, Combat was there.

When the Regiment stood down in early 1971, the official policy was that all mascots had to be left behind in Vietnam. But Combat was special – he'd been in country longer than any other Blackhorse Trooper. And he had the scars to prove it. John Sherman Crow was the regimental opera-

tions officer at the time, and he recalls that "Combat was no longer white, he was the color of the red dirt, with a number of scars. We all loved him to death." The 43rd Colonel of the Regiment prevailed on his boss at US Army Vietnam to make an exception to the rule for Combat. The special request was submitted and approved, a Trooper volunteered, and took Combat home when he DEROSed in March 1971.

Chaplain's Corner

Let's talk about R&R's for a while. Did you go on R&R when you were in Vietnam? Where did you go? Can you name all the locations you had to choose from? As I recall they were Hong Kong, Kuala Lumpur, Manila, Sydney, Hawaii, Bangkok, Singapore and Taipei. Right? If I'm wrong you're welcome to let me know. On the other hand, did something happen so you couldn't go? Were you a casualty or what? I hope you came through OK.

No one doubts that everyone needed the rejuvenation. So it was too bad when Victor Charlie got active at exactly the wrong time so a few of you missed out on R&R. You had to stick around to shoot back at the bad guys. But, hey! (or Hay!). Anyway, if you got your R&R as planned, you would have known how great it was to get out of Vietnam for a few days see the beautiful side of things. Every one who went made their own experience on their time away from the war. Everyone had their own "holidays, vacations, R&R's" (Everyone except those who got a bad break, like I mentioned). Some who went to Australia went back again. They had met a "nice girl" who dated them but didn't fool around. They fell in love. Now they were going back to marry her and they did.

Have I told you about my handlebar mustache? No? Well, officially, if you wanted to sport a mustache (Navy excepted) you had to have it trimmed in a very precise way. Out in the bush no one much cared about detail. We thought they looked pretty cool (we didn't call it cool, then, we called it something else like "neat" or "bitchin"). So when my turn came, after about six months in country, I went on R&R. When I went to check in at Tan Son Nhut, the clerk told me I had to cut my handlebars off or I wouldn't get orders to go. Well, I didn't think that was cool so I went to see the commander to get a better opinion. Bad move on my part - my opinion didn't count. I decided I wanted to go on R&R more than I wanted the handlebars - they became trash and I went to Sydney.

for R&R, which I think was the official name. A hallmark (means very important thing) of combat in World Wars I and II, was a front line, a specific place where you know the fighting was happening. Soldiers who were fighting on the front lines were rotated to the read from time to time for some R&R to get a breather. It help keep their heads together and to keep them from going completely berserk, instead of going just partly berserk. It was a practical matter. In Vietnam there wasn't any front line. The battle line could have been at the rear where the barber or mama-san or monthly girl friend could be a Viet Cong. Pressure was everywhere, so troops were sent out of country for R&R. We got clear out of Nam to remove, regroup, renew, regenerate, relax, recharge, review, recuperate, recreate, reconstitute, get renovated, and then return (what did you expect?). Short-term R&R centers in country were helpful too, like China Beach or Vung Tau, which most troops in the bush never saw. Out of country R&R's were in a bigger league, much bigger.

I didn't go to all R&R places, being in Vietnam for only two tours. However, I was fortunate to go to three: Sidney on my first tour, Manila and Bangkok on my second. I don't remember why I got two during my second tour except that it was happening at the time. I went to Bangkok because Hong Kong was more popular and filled its quota first. But Bangkok was fine too - I got rested, rejuvenated and somewhat recreated too. I observed many soldiers using the same benefits. I did observe some soldiers using a few extra benefits. Being a chaplain, I just let them pass. I'll just let it pass since if you were there you already know.

I'll tell you a story about Sydney which you'll enjoy. Not everyone went to Sydney. Others went somewhere else. But Sydney was very popular and in high demand. We all know what a lot of troopers were after when they went on R&R, and Sydney was no exception. But Sydney was special because the people were about the same as Americans. (They drove on the wrong side of the road, but you couldn't drive anyway so it didn't matter - it just looked funny to have traffic driving on the left side of busy streets). Anyway, I guess there were enough "ladies of the night" available to satisfy the "need". However, there were many nice young ladies who registered at the R&R center in the lobby of the Kings Cross Hotel. They made themselves available to have a date with a soldier (or airman, sailor, marine) to go to dinner, a movie, a concert or whatever. They were nice girls, they were well behaved, and didn't mess around. (Like I already said, there were some who did mess around.) The men must have appreciated them. That's because all the way back to Vietnam they were so happy about meeting such nice girls. Most places guys would have been talking about their sexual exploits and adventures. (these weren't conquests because many were bar girls who easily conned the soldiers into buying their expensive diluted tea drinks and then took their bucks for a roll in the hay.) I couldn't count how many guys wanted to go back to Sydney to marry the nice girls they had dated. Some actually did. A Vietnam vet friend of mine went back and married the girl he met on R&R. They're still married. Isn't that great?

That's a quickie R&R story. I don't have time to talk about more stories like the time I got lost in the Philippines or a soldier in Bangkok who convinced a salesclerk into offering him a bronze dinner set for dirt cheap. Then the soldier left without the set but the exasperated clerk crying.

I'll add one more rest and recuperation source before I sign off. In the old days, life could be real hard. Life can still be

hard so I'll hope you'll consider this additional R&R resource. The word on it comes from Jesus Christ, "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light." (Matthew 11:30-30) This is the big R&R.

R&Rs were good times. I'm sure you still need one once in a while. So take an R&R from time to time. When it comes to the recreating and storing of your mind and soul - take the but R&R all the time. This one is forever. God bless you.

God loves you. So do I.

Just One More Day

eptember 23, 1967. For the past 36 hours or so I've been very anxious as I had already turned in my helmet, flak jacket, and my M-16. I left Blackhorse base camp for the last time on my way to Long Bien, South Vietnam for final out processing. With all my paperwork completed, I sat around all day on pins and needles. At two thirty or three o'clock, we were sent over by truck to Bien Hoa Air Base, again we had to wait until about four o'clock. They called out our flight, and as we got to the person at the gate we had to call out last name, first name, and service number. Then we got on board the Intercontinental Airlines 707 (the Freedom Bird). As I boarded the plane with about another 160 guys you could cut the anxiety with a knife, nobody wanted to be this close to getting home and then have something happen. You could have heard a pin drop in that plane. NOBODY was talking, I mean NOBODY! As I sat in my seat on the port side of the plane, the sun shone through my window. I could see my reflection in the window, and I can remember thinking to myself this is like a scene out of a movie. I also remember thinking that now that it's over, that year went fast. The door closed, and the plane started to roll toward the end of the runway. Engines revved up and we started rolling down the runway, then the nose lifted and under full throttle we took off. We climbed at a very steep angle to get

altitude quickly and still NOBODY is saying a word. After a minute or two the pilot came over the loud speaker and said "Gentleman we have left South Vietnam air space" and all hell broke loose! After 11 months and 21 days I was out of there and on my way home, I made it!

So here I am 49 years later, and although I'm not physically in Vietnam I'm still there mentally. If you have never been in a war zone you probably have no clue to the anxiety level that is felt on a 24/7 bases for an entire year. The anxiety is always there, even if you don't realize it. It's always hiding somewhere in the shadows or over your shoulder but it's there. War is strange, one minute you could be bored out of your mind, and the next you're fighting for your life. You never want to let down your guard even when you're bored, if you do, you go home in a body bag. You just want "One more day Lord, just one more day." That's what you pray for every night "Just one more day." I'm so blessed to have the family I have, especially my wife Patti. They may not know what I'm thinking about at times, but they know it's somehow related to Vietnam and they are always supportive of me. Someone once wrote, "Not everyone who lost his life in Vietnam died there, not everyone who came home from Vietnam ever left there." One thing I have come to realize is that you can never forget Vietnam, so you might as well embrace it.

SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM UPDATE

he 11th ACVVC Scholarship Program has awarded 390 **I** scholarships totaling \$1,264,000 to children of our members and KIAs since its inception in 1996. In 2016, we were able to award 15 scholarships totaling \$62,000 to children of our members. Every scholarship dollar paid to these deserving applicants was donated by YOU, the members of this great association of Blackhorse combat veterans!! You will find a usable copy of the current Scholarship Application in this issue of Thunder Run (page 20) and also on our website.

Our Scholarship Guide provides more information on the scholarship process and contains detailed assistance on completing the scholarship application. Applicants planning on attending graduate school programs are eligible to apply for a scholarship, however undergraduate applicants will be given preference in the judging process. You can print a copy of the Guide and the Application at www.11thcavnam.com. If you have a child (natural, step child or adopted) who is planning on attending a college, community college or trade school this fall, please encourage them to apply for a scholarship.

Beginning in 2008, each recipient's Scholarship Award has been dedicated to honor a specific 11th Cavalry "Blackhorse" Trooper who was Killed in Action (KIA) in Vietnam or Cambodia. The Blackhorse KIAs to be honored each year will be selected on an impartial and random basis. An attractive certificate suitable for framing containing information about the trooper in whose honor their scholarship is dedicated is sent to each recipient.

In addition, each year, one recipient is selected to receive a special Colonel Charles L. Schmidt Leadership Scholarship award in honor of former 11ACVVC President Chuck Schmidt

A scholarship applicant must fall into one of the following categories:

• A child, stepchild, or adopted child of an 11th Armored Cavalry Trooper who was Killed In Action

• (KIA), Died of wounds (DOW), or died as a result of the Trooper's service in Vietnam or Cambodia.

• A child, stepchild, or adopted child of a current member of the 11thACVVC in good standing.

• A child, stepchild, or adopted child of an 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment veteran who served in Vietnam or Cambodia but is not a member of the 11th ACVVC may apply after their father joins/rejoins the 11th ACVVC.

There is no age limit for applicants. Grandchildren of members are not currently eligible. The criterion to include Grandchildren as eligible for scholarships is reviewed annually by your 11th ACVVC board of directors.

THE NATIONAL ANTHEM

The United States Flag Code is a set of guidelines that lays forth proper American Flag etiquette for just about every scenario you can think of, including how to act during the singing of the National Anthem. Specifically we'll look at Title 36 of the US Flag Code, Section 301

Title 36 U.S. Code, Section 301, National Anthem, outlines the proper etiquette during the national anthem.

(a) Designation.— The composition consisting of the words and music known as the Star-Spangled Banner is the national anthem.

(b) Conduct During Playing.—During a rendition of the national anthem—

(1) when the flag is displayed—

(A) individuals in uniform should give the military

salute at the first note of the anthem and maintain that position until the last note;

(B) members of the Armed Forces and veterans who are present but not in uniform may render the military salute in the manner provided for individuals in uniform; and

(C) all other persons present should face the flag and stand at attention with their right hand over the heart, and men not in uniform, if applicable, should remove their headdress with their right hand and hold it at the left shoulder, the hand being over the heart; and

(2) when the flag is not displayed, all present should face toward the music and act in the same manner they would if the flag were displayed.

Reunion Assistance Fund

1. Do so in writing to the Secretary or the President, and

2. Provide evidence of the Trooper's service in Vietnam and/or Cambodia with the 11th Armored Cavalry "Blackhorse" Regiment.

The applicant Trooper or KIA survivor should describe his/her need for monetary assistance, briefly stating his/her financial situation. In addition, the Trooper may be required to become a member, of the 11th ACVVC. The Officers and Directors of 11th ACVVC will decide by a majority vote on whom and how much assistance will be given to a Trooper or Survivor of a KIA. **Requests must be submitted no later than to July 15, 2017.**







Book Reviews

Armor Goes to War - The 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment and the Vietnam War, December 1965 to December 1966





This article appears in the Spring 2016 issue of *Army History* magazine published by the US Army Center of Military History. This is an excellent article covering the period when the 11th ACR was preparing to deploy to Vietnam through the first several months in country. The online version is available at:

John Carland, formerly a historian at the Center of Military History (CMH), delivers a compelling narrative about the Army's use of armor during the early days of U.S. combat operations in Vietnam. Specifically, Carland highlights the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment as it moved into the country, established a permanent base, and began to engage the enemy. In 1965–1966, there were still many questions about the effectiveness of armor in the terrain and fighting environment of Vietnam. Changes to the unit's structure, armor complement, weaponry, and tactics were made in preparation for the perceived difficulties, but were as yet, untested elements.


