Blackhorse CO to be Reunion Speaker

Former Blackhorse CO Wallace Nutting, a native of Saco, ME retired to Biddeford Pool, ME in 1985 after more than 35 years in the U.S. Army. In 1986 he was an Associate Fellow at the Center for Int'l Affairs, Harvard University. Since 1986 he has served as a Senior Fellow at the Institute of Higher Defense Studies, National Defense University.

During World War II, General Nutting served in the Maine State Guard. He fought in the Korean War in 1950-51, had two command tours in the Vietnam War, and served three overseas tours in Germany and one in Latin America. In 1966, he commanded the 1st Squadron, 10th Cavalry at Fort Lewis, Washington. He trained and deployed his unit to Vietnam. He returned to Vietnam in 1970 to command the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment. In Germany he commanded the 1st Infantry Division, (Forward) and the 3rd Armor Division. In 1979, he was appointed Commander-in-Chief, US Southern Command, Republic of Panama, simultaneous with implementation of the new Panama Canal Treaties. In 1983, he

will be given out at the reunion in Nashville and will be made available to our other members upon request.

Vice President and Scholarship chairman, John Sorich has been discussing possible designs for a portable monument to our 768 KIAs with member Dave Tessier. If you'll remember, Dave was responsible for getting an 11th Cav monument and tank in Colorado Springs, CO. We all appreciate his expertise. The design is leaning toward having portable panels for each Sqdn. and Troop/Company letter. This monument would require a special shipping container so it could be transported to each reunion. This would free up monies spent each year for bus rentals and would also free up most of a day in travel time to and from monuments in various cities that we might go to. This, we think will give our attendees more free time to be with their buddies or time to visit the sites the city might have to offer.

Don Snedeker, our Historian has agreed to provide a "Time Line" of the history we have collected about our duty in Vietnam and Cambodia. This "Time Line" would start when we left for Vietnam in Aug.-Sep. of 1966 and continue through our departure of Vietnam in April of 1972. Each line of history would be indicated by a short description of what happened each day of contact with the enemy, operations starts and finishes, KIA/WIA info, etc. This will be a lengthy process and will take some time to finish.

The Reunion Committee, chaired by Gene Johnson is looking at three possible sites for the 2004 reunion. Once negotiations are completed, the committee will submit its recommendation to the Officers and Directors for site selection. he 11ACVVC Officers and Board of Directors' (BoD) first quarter 2002 activities involved dozens of membership subjects discussed in over 400 emails and scores of telephone calls. Whereas only a few subjects required formal Officer and BoD motions and votes, each subject was important to the overall function of the 11ACVVC for the benefit of its membership.

First, an overview of the official motions:

- ◆ Motion 2002-0311 passed unanimously. Made by John Sorich and seconded by Mike Forbes: Donate \$200 to the organization M.O.M.G.T. to provide some golf balls, tees, etc. but without creating the false impression that the golf game is an 11ACVVC activity.
- ♦ Motion 2002-0308 made by Eric Newton and seconded by Ollie Pickral passed unanimously. The Officers and BoD authorized our 11th ACVVC negotiating team to sign a business agreement, which would be beneficial to the 11th ACVVC by transferring the rights to use the contents of the book, "The Blackhorse in Vietnam," to motion picture agents to be determined for a potential motion picture from a film production company.
- ◆ Motion 2002-0326B passed by unanimous vote. Mike Forbes 's motion to purchase 600 (reduced from original motion of 1,000) Agent Orange pamphlets for distribution to all interested members. Motion was seconded by Ollie Pickral
- ◆ Motion 2002-0406 by Eric Newton and seconded Frank Cambria — "The 11th ACVVC shall purchase Directors and Officers Liability Insurance to cover all Directors and Officers against legal action due to

their position and official duties with the organization."

- ♦ Motion 2002-0104. It has been recorded as Officer and BoD authorization that the following expense approval was granted on Jan. 4 2002 by the Officers and BoD by majority vote: Request funds not to exceed \$275.00 for the purchase of three 11th Cavalry flag battle streamers @ about \$85 each, not including tax, etc. Some of the subjects discussed and debated by the Officers and BoD on behalf of the membership included:
- Funds to purchase signs for our reunions, including:
 MEMBERS ONLY, REGISTRATION, QUAR-

MEMBERS ONLY, REGISTRATION, QUARTERMASTER, BUNKER PARTY, SILENT AUCTION, RAFFLE TICKETS, WOMENS MEETING, BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING, CHAPEL SERVICE, MEMORIAL SERVICE, ETC.

- Possible purchase of a fax machine.
- Which Agent Orange books would best help our membership
- Guest speakers for future reunions
- Having V.A. speakers and/or representatives at our reunions
- Improving and maintaining relations with our brothers in the BHA and the 11th Cavalry.
- Reunion format and activity scheduling
- Repositioning some Certificates of Deposits into U.S. Government mutual funds.
- Transportation difficulties of moving reunion attendees to distant scheduled events (memorial services, etc)
- Long term financial planning for 11ACVVC assets

If you can't work in extra time in August then maybe you can plan to visit us at another time. In the western part of the state you can visit Graceland-Elvis' home—The Peabody Hotel which brings ducks into the lobby fountain daily—Henning which is Alex

Haley's childhood home — Slave Haven Underground Museum and a lot of other points of interest around Memphis. Then there's Reelfoot Lake in Tiptonville, formed when an earthquake caused the Mississippi River to run backward for 3 days—and don't forget Jack Daniels Distillery in Lynchburg which is in a dry county and then there's Shiloh National Military Park.

Middle Tennessee has the Hermitage, home of President Andrew Jackson—the Parthenon which is the worlds only full size replica of the Parthenon in Greece—the Opryland Hotel, The Ryman Auditorium, which was the old home of the Grand Ole Opry and several other points of interest, several of which are listed on the 11th Cav website so I won't spend a lot of time on the Nashville attractions.

Around Chattanooga there's the Lost Sea, Americas largest underground Lake – Ruby Falls which has a 145 ft underground waterfall – Tennessee Aquarium which has live sharks in their tanks— Lookout Mountain where you can see 7 states and don't forget Rock City and the Tennessee Civil War Museum.

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Further east you will find the Great Smoky Mountains – Gatlinburg which has lots of things to see including Ripley's Aguarium of the Smokies, which has the worlds longest underwater tunnel in it's 1.4 million gallon aquarium—Ober Gatlinburg Park - Christus Gardens which has a three dimensional diorama depicting the life of Christ and there's numerous other attractions. Close by is Pigeon Forge which has Dollywood Theme Park Splash Country water adventure park – Dixie Stampede where you can have dinner and watch a fun show with horses. wagons, riders in costumes and they involve the audience dividing them into the north and south and will have you cheering and stomping your feet with the show! There are lots of shows, attractions, games, shopping malls and enough to see and do for the whole family to enjoy. Then there's Oak Ridge which has the American Museum of Science and Energy and was a super secret city of WW II. The Museum of Appalachia in Norris has authentic log cabins, buildings and thousands of artifacts used by early settlers to the area. In Knoxville a few points of interest are the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame, the Knoxville Zoo and The University of Tennessee.

Bristol was the Birthplace of Country Music and has a country music museum and the state line of Bristol TN and Bristol VA is down the middle of State Street. For you race fans there's the Bristol Motor Speedway and the Bristol Dragway, which offers tours of the facilities for a small fee. Greeneville has President Andrew Johnson's home. Jonesborough has the National Storytelling Festival in Oct. and Erwin has the National Fish Hatchery, which furnishes rainbow trout nationwide. Erwin is also the town that hung an elephant after she killed her trainer. Kingsport has Bays Mountain Park and Nature preserve. Tennessee has caves to explore that offers tours to the public in several areas of the state, whitewater rafting, battlefields, hiking trails, golf, fishing and loads of other things to do and see.

VA Benefits Seminar – Nashville

Most members of the 11th Armored Cavalry Veterans of Vietnam and Cambodia are eligible for benefits provided by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) simply due to the fact of your service to your country. Benefits range all the way from the simple filing for a VA guaranty, no money down, home loan; to relatively complicated filing for disability compensation; to burial in a VA cemetery or headstone and burial plot allowance in a private cemetery. Although most veterans are aware of the VA and of its role to provide assistance, many are unaware of how to apply for benefits, which benefits they are eligible for, and are intimidated by the "Red Tape" and seemingly complicated procedures to establish eligibility. The most daunting seem to be those benefits provided by the VA Medical Centers and Clinics and subsequent claims for disability benefits.

Aches and Pains

As we grow older, and all of us are, we start to notice that ailments and conditions that we may have tolerated when younger have gotten worse over time and are no longer bearable. Many of these conditions may be related to our military service and, if service connected, be eligible for treatment at VA Medical facilities and may also establish a disability rating which may qualify for monthly VA disability compensation. These payments can range from around \$100 per month for a 10% disability to over \$2000 per month for a disability classified as 100% or, if one or a combination of disabilities make you unemployable.

Agent Orange (AO)

Did you know that there are currently more than 13 diseases and over 29 separate types of Soft Tissue Sarcoma Cancers recognized by the VA as having a connection to exposure to "Agent Orange" (AO) and are therefore treatable by the VA and probably eligible for disability compensation? In addition, the National Academy of Sciences (NAS) is currently studying more than 25 other diseases for a possible causative relationship to AO exposure. Did you also know that the III Corps area of 'Nam was one of the most heavily sprayed areas in the country and this was the main area of operations of the 11th Cav? To prove to the VA that you were exposed to AO all you have to do is produce evidence showing you served in Vietnam! Did you know that you—all veterans of the 11th Cav who served in 'Nam—are eligible for a free medical exam by the VA to determine if you currently have any symptoms of diseases related to AO?

Post Tauumatic Stress Disorder

An increasing number of Vietnam veterans are experiencing a condition known as "Post Traumatic Stress Disorder" or PTSD. As we age, start to retire, and have more leisure time on our hands, more and more of us are starting to be affected by this disease. Although somewhat difficult to establish, diagnosis of PTSD almost invariably results in compensation and eligibility for treatment by the VA. For this condition as well as any other, it is essential to establish a claim as early as possible as compensation is usually payable from the date that the claim was filed rather than the date benefits are awarded.

Advocates/Representatives

The VA claims process can be complicated. Therefore, veterans should, in most cases, not try to represent themselves before the VA in processing a claim. Veterans can get free help from State and/or County Agencies or Veterans Service Organizations (VSO's). Many of us are familiar with and are probably members of one or more of these organi-American Legion, Disabled zations. American Veterans (DAV), and Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) are just a few of these service organizations available to assist. Additionally, most VSO's are fellow veterans and will relate to your service, sacrifices and needs.

So, watching this movie today, I was able to better understand what many of our young soldiers felt. Although you didn't get the intense feelings and vibrations and smells as what they did by actually being there, I found myself feel-

ing afraid and tense and wanting it all to just stop. Yet at the same time I was in awe of the countryside. I kept thinking, 'how can a country that looks to be green and lush and lovely as this be soon covered in the blood of so many men who died or were wounded for something they may not have understood themselves'.

of fear and sadness as one by one the wives received their telegram informing them of their husbands death. Several times I felt Bob look at me only to see many, many tears rolling down my face and hearing me sob uncontrollably. I also stole glances at him from time to time only to see him tense and have a look come across his face as I'm sure he was remembering his time there and those buddies he lost.

As the movie ended, the people walked quietly out of the theater as we continued to sit and read the credits. As we sat there we held hands and I could feel the sadness we both felt for those that did not return to their loved ones and at the same time feeling relief that Bob had come home safely so that we could meet and start a life together.

I left the theater wishing that tomorrow was the day to leave for this year's reunion so that I could hug each of our 'heroes' and thank them for what they did and let them know that I am so very proud of them.

Well, girls until we meet in Nashville I will say so long for now. And to each of you guys that read the Women's Corner, I want to say Thank You and I am so proud of each of you.

Btry, 3rd Sqdn.: I am trying to get those troopers whose MOS was for artillery and mortars interested in getting awarded a badge. The 11th ACR had three howitzer groups plus four 4.2 inch mortar tracks for each Troop. That means a lot of troopers did not get a CIB for their service in the War. I am interested in pursuing by an act of Congress, a CAB (Combat Artillery Badge) for artillery personnel.

I feel that this would be a truly just cause for the 11th ACVVC to follow up on behalf of its membership. My main concern is that all of us who saw combat, didn't get recognized for their service and if filing a claim with the VA, without a CIB, you are not judged to have served in a combat role.

Chaplain's Corner

Chaplain Larry Haworth

We were young then – They are now

Did you know that the average age of the soldier in Viet Nam was about 19? You already knew that? OK. I guess it's common knowledge by now. Not that anyone had to tell you. Just remember back to those days. Or, better yet, pull out those old snapshots your buddies took over there in the jungle. You looked like a kid. Of course, if you were average (or younger), you really were just a kid. Not that you would have admitted it then. But from your perspective these thirty-some years later you see you really were a kid. Of course, fighting the war in Viet Nam made you a grown up kid real fast. On the other hand, some of us were on the high side of that average of 19. Like I was 30. That made me an old man. Old man at 30?? Yeah, I guess so. At least over there. Not that I was alone. Plenty of lifers were my age. A few non-lifers too. Some even older.

Now, here we are, fighting this war on terrorism. As I'm writing we're right in the middle of it. Whenever you read this we'll probably still be in it. Maybe it'll get even worse than it is right now. Not worse than 11 September. But worse than right now. I hope not. We have a great new generation of young soldiers and I don't think any of us want to see them go over to Afghanistan or Iraq or Lower Slobbovia or anywhere else to fight any more wars, including terrorism wars. But that's what freedom and democracy are all about. Someone has to pay the cost or it's all gone and done. I hope you recognize that the current generation of soldiers is the next generation down from us. In other words, they are our kids. For some of us, they are our grandkids. Maybe not literally, but "generationally." Like, I don't have any biological kids, myself. But I can still think of these young soldiers as being my kids because we're all Americans and we're all in this together. Besides, I have nephews and nieces and close friends who call me "Uncle" and I love them like my own flesh and blood. So these young men and women in uniform today are my kids. They're your kids too.

I had an experience the other day that pointed all this out to me. I got to thinking about how time goes so fast, how "we get too soon old and too late schmart." Ever hear that one before? Yes? So you know what I mean. I went over to Fort Irwin when I was in Southern California visiting family and my old stomping grounds. That's where the National Training Center is located. You already knew that? So then you know what I'm talking about. I drove my 40 foot diesel motorhome there and parked behind regimental headquarters. No, I didn't sneak in. How could I do that? It's almost as loud as a tank. But a lot more comfortable. It's where I live (with my wife) and they invited me to park it there for a few days. Nice guys. They treated me very well. Like they really appreciate Viet Nam vet troopers. We (you) are real role models for them. They look up to you (us). But then, we're like their dads to them. Or at least like their dad's generation. Seems like I said something like this a minute ago, didn't I? Well, one of our troopers from our Viet Nam days was there too. He was treated as well as I was. (Maybe better - we didn't measure.) I think they even had an officer escort him around. He was a real VIP. They actually let him sleep out in the field with the troopers. You're kidding, you say!! You say, what? No, they didn't order him to go out to the field. How could they? He's a civilian. I doubt if he's taken an order from an officer or NCO for thirty years or more. He went out overnight because he wanted to. He asked. I didn't see him the next day, but I think he wanted to do it just for the experience and the memories. Maybe to make himself feel young again too. After all, like I said, these kids were the same age as him when he was in Viet Nam. Besides. they were in the field with all the hardships and dirt except no one was shooting at them for real. Big difference. Much better - and you know what I'm talking about.

Did I go out overnight too, you ask? Well, actually, no. What I did was to go out all day starting at 0600 hours (That's 6:00 A.M., remember?) Which was most of what brought all this to mind. I was out

there with all these great young soldiers who looked exactly like y'all did back in those Viet Nam days. Speaking of bringing back old memories! However, they weren't you. They weren't us. We weren't back in the Nam. We were at the National Training Center preparing for whatever war would be forced on this country. These kids were training to go into harms way like we did for this country, your country and mine. And theirs. These are our kids. The next generation which came after us.

I'm going to tell you something else that really drove it home to me. Want to hear it? (You can always skip this part - but then you'd never know what I was going to say.) I spent the whole day riding around in a humvee. Let me tell you, humvees are sure a lot better than jeeps. I was always used to riding around in jeeps. Not in the jungles, of course, just when I visited the hospitals in the rear when we took casualties and such like that. Anyway, guess who's humvee I was riding around in. You'd never guess, so I'll tell you. It was the Command Sergeant Major's humvee. I will resist getting sidetracked here because my point is the Regimental Command Sergeant Major. And my point with him is that he was a PFC in Germany when I was over there after Viet Nam. He wasn't even old enough to be a Blackhorse trooper in Viet Nam, especially not during the early years, or for the boat ride over in '66. Now here he is, the enlisted ole man of the regiment. And he's a lot younger than me (always will be, too). Probably younger than you too, but that's a close call. Either way, he's close enough to you so you would have been in it together, except for a couple of years in time and some geography in distance.

Now here we are, thirty years and more later. Those young troopers are out there in that desert whereas we were over there in that jungle. All for the same purpose of keeping this great land of ours free and what we want it to be. The Blackhorse patch is still proud and visible. Mostly it's proud because of the reputation we gained for it in Viet Nam. We continued a proud tradition from the early days of the century

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and WWII. Desert Storm and now the National Training Center are keeping our tradition alive and well and proud which is what I already said. The troopers of today's generation sure look up to our generation just like I hope we looked up to our dad's WWII generation. One thing for sure, we look in the mirror and wonder what happened. We may get out an old uniform or some old pants and realize they don't fit over the paunch any more. That's when we realize that time does indeed march on. Generations come and generations go. Ours was a "dynamite" generation. Still is. We contributed far more than people knew at the time. History and the march of time have proven the value of the Viet Nam vet, including the Blackhorse trooper in the jungles of Viet Nam. We are a great bunch. So is the current generation of troopers. They're proving their value too. And they look to us as role models and heroes, believe it or not. That's what I believe. That's what I've seen with my own eyeballs wide open.

One day we'll be gone. But I'll tell you for sure, we'll not be forgotten. We've made our mark. As far as I'm concerned this country of ours, the good ole US of A, is a lot better because the 11th ACR, the Blackhorse, rode through. It's still riding. We're still making our mark. Only now there's a new generation on board.

I'll close off with a section of the Bible that is appropriate about how time passes on. It's from the Old Testament book of Psalms chapter 103 and verses 13-18: "As a father has compassion on his children, so the Lord has compassion on those who fear

him (fear means what it says plus respect, honor, reverence and love); for he knows how we are formed, he remembers that we are dust. As for man, his days are like grass, he flourishes like a flower of the field; the wind blows over it and it is gone, and its place remembers it no more. But from everlasting to everlasting the Lord's love is with those who fear him, and his righteousness with their children's children with those who keep his covenant and remember to obey his precepts."

Well, time just keeps moving on, which I say again for emphasis. Like my folks used to say, time goes faster and faster the older you get. I suppose your folks said the same thing. Now here I am, in my mid-sixties and doggone if Dad wasn't right. It's good to see that the Blackhorse is still "in the saddle," so to speak (go figure that one). But, mostly it's good to see that God is still "on the throne." After all. when all is said and done and even the young generation has grown old (older?), God is still on the throne, God is still there, God is still providing for our life's purpose and our soul's salvation through his son. Jesus the Christ. And if events of the past several months are any indication, a mission will always be there for you, me, the Blackhorse and whoever comes after.

God bless the Blackhorse. God bless the generations of troopers. God bless America.
