For many years Chaplain Larry Haworth wrote an article for Thunder Run. He always ended the article with the words "God loves you and so do I". When wording of the award was being developed echoing that sentiment in a paraphrase of those words was decided to be appropriate. From the time Captain Haworth ministered to the young men of the 11th Armored Cavalry in the jungles of Vietnam in 1969-1970 to the years 1986 and forward serving the "older" Veterans of the 11th ACVVC, the love he had for these men was always evident. But the love and respect they had for him wasn't fully realized during those days of their youth in a time of war and awaiting their time to go home.

As the years passed after coming home from Vietnam some memories faded but many would not be forgotten. Some of what was remembered were those Sundays that Chaplain Haworth would step off a chopper and set up his make shift chapel. Those young men were given the opportunity to put aside their daily routine of waging war and share in the thoughts of peace and love.

The significance of those brief respites and the message that was being conveyed began to be fully appreciated when at the reunions of the 11th ACVVC Larry would again set up his alter, now a proper one, and again shared his message as he did in the jungle so long ago.

If it had not been for the words of our Chaplain in those darker days in Vietnam we would have lost sight of the love that men could still feel and forgotten that peace still existed, somewhere, and on those Sundays that peace was with us.

During the presentation of Larry's award love and peace, were evident in the faces and acts of every man (and woman) present. It was shown in the handshakes and hugs exchanged freely and without pause between the men that had been linked together by a war so long ago and now bonded by the comfort found in the same words that were spoken then and now. It was underscored by the respect and reverence shown to the man who once again shared his wisdom.

For this we honor Chaplain Larry Haworth, The man that God loves, and so do we.

ule the ride at least 4 hours in advance. If you want to use the shuttle schedule it before you leave home, and you will need the confirmation number before boarding the shuttle. The web site is also on the hotel registration confirmation page, or visit the web page for "LASexpress." If at all possible do not take a taxi! I did this on arrival and was "long hauled" to the hotel and it cost more than double the shuttle rate. If you are arriving late consider Uber. If a taxi is the only transportation tell the driver you will report him if he takes the long way to the hotel. The trip should be straight up Paradise Dr. from the airport to the hotel in no more than 15 minutes. If the taxi takes you onto I-15, it's the long way.

The tram stops at the hotel and is painless to use and is a very good way to get to the Strip. You can get a discount on the fare by going to https://tix.lvmonorail.com.11thACVVC. Follow the instructions to purchase the number of days you want to ride. The reservations must be purchased on line to get the discount. It can not be done at the station.

I did not use the scooter service but I did see many of them in the hotel. Those can be reserved at the time you make reservations.

If you want information on things to do while you are in Vegas go to the Convention Bureau website (LVCVA.com). There is also information on the Hotel confirmation web site.

The in-room amenities can be somewhat misleading. In room unsecure WIFI

is available for no cost but a secure connection does have a cost. If you drink the bottled water it's extra, same with the coffee. If you want more than I cup, there's a Starbucks in the lobby. Just be aware of the unpublished costs.

Pay attention to each bank of elevators, they only go to certain floors and there is security to admit only those who have a room-key after 10:00pm. For those who have their service dogs with them, there is an area near the North parking garage for pet relief. Please be a responsible pet parent and pick up after your little friend. There is ample evidence that many people do not.

Please adhere to our cutoff dates. Reunion registration cutoff date is July 24, 2019. Hotel registration is 3 days prior to your scheduled arrival. All is fully refundable if done so by these dates. Late registrations cannot be honored. This isn't just an arbitrary date. The 11th ACVVC officers responsible for making the reunion a success must have time to process all registrations, have your reunion packets and name tags ready, set the bunker and banquet rooms to accommodate the number of attendees and have the hotel prepare the correct number of meals. All before they themselves leave to go to the reunion. Planning a successful reunion is a huge endeavor. You can help make it more enjoyable for everyone by making your reservations early.

Eleventh Cavalry Plans Observance of Mexican Battle

MONTEREY, April 27 — Plans are under way at the Presidio of Monterey for the celebration by the Eleventh Cavalry of the tenth Anniversary of the Regiment's success in the engagement at Ojo Azules, Mexico. This was on May 5, 1916 when the organization served with General John J. Pershing in the punitive expedition across the border.



The engagement anniversary will be celebrated this year on that date and will take the place of the customary celebration of the anniversary of the organization of the regiment which oc- curred on Feb 2. It was on Feb. 2 1902, that congress authorized the organization of the Eleventh Cavalry, but at the suggestion of Colonel Leon B. Fromer, post commander it was decided this year to celebrate the battle of Ojo Azules instead of the organization.

Plans for the celebration have been announced by Captain Alex- ander B. McNabb, post adjutant. A short program of military ex- ercises, including the review of the regiment will mark the early part of the day. At noon, the men of the post will be served a hol- iday dinner. The afternoon will be devoted to sports.

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VA Claims and other 'stuff'

reetings again fellow Blackhorse vets! So — evidently, some members read the previous article in the 1st Quarter edition of *Thunder Run* as I have been in contact with a few vets and one fellow member rendered some thoughts of his own. Okay, one purpose of my submissions is to elicit discussion – and so it has! Great — Let's keep the conversation lively and let's move on! Actually — Allons!

Mind you fellow reader, the topics I share with you derive from my own experiences as a VSO. As such, how I approach a veteran, and or the vet's family, seeking assistance may very well differ in some nuance from other VSO's approach to advocacy. However the approach, advising a veteran is a primary responsibility. As a fellow vet-especially a Nam vet- "I tell it like it is". My intention is to inform a claimant of what the VA MUST have to substantiate a claim for compensation which was basically provided in the previous article. By so advising and ensuring all supporting medical and related evidence is accumulated and arranged in a Fully Developed Claim, once submitted, the prospects of that claim becoming an award for the veteran is greatly enhanced. Granted- there are no guarantees- especially with the VBA! However- the advocacy of a VSO is to promote the best advice. "Tell it like it is". So far for the past seven years- it works! More on this in a future article. Oh, by the way- most VSO's incorporate the "Intent to File "claim, with close management.

PTSD! Post Traumatic Stress Disorder.

The one wound no individual is ever prepared to encounter. A wound which, although not visible, manifests in so many visible manners. According to the American Psychiatric Associations, DSM V, PTSD is an anxiety disorder which merits a unique category only because unlike other anxiety disorders, this uninvited guest lingers- indefinitely. During so many office visits with veterans – and sometimes with a spouse- a claim for a condition, or conditions, will be prepared. Once the claim is

"finished" and prior to saying our goodbyes, I allow a moment of silence before I inquire of one more condition, especially of a Nam vet- or any combat vet. IF the spouse is present, I quietly mention to the vet that I am going to ask the spouse a question. Most often, the response is "Okay". "Spouse have you two ever been driving somewhere, of just sitting around, and everything is nice. Then you just happen to utter a thought or do something and out of the blue, your vet's behavior goes south- for no apparent reason! He yells at you, says something that hurts. Then after some time has passed, he's sorry beyond words. Has this happened in your lives together?" When my fellow vet bows his head, when tears swell in her eyes, and his eyes, I know my advocacy is not quite completed. Understanding this medical condition and exactly what the VBA requires of any mental health claim is so important. Of critical importance is an acknowledgement that the VA folks who process a claim- for the most part- have no medical background of any nature. They simply read what an examiner reports on a compensation examination. They do not interpret; they rate by what the examiner renders. Another "By the way"- VA only will accept a diagnosis for any mental health condition from a Psychologist or Physiatrist. A "diagnosis" from a social worker, Nurse practitioner, counselor will not be considered as a true diagnosis. Anyway- on to a claim-

• VA 21-526EZ, VA 21-0781, VA 21-4138, DD 214 (DD 215 if applicable), VA 21-686c, personal statements from "buddies" or family in support of a claim, orders or related military documents if in possession of and whatever else deemed important. This "stuff" I refer to is actually very important to support a claim for any mental health condition including PTSD especially if this is a first ever claim for a vet. The

following is my methodology which has been successful through the years. Allons-

- 21-526EZ- the claim. What is the vet indicating is a medical problem? In this example, PTSD (or any mental health condition), due to combat.
- DD 214 (215 if applicable) This will indicate what the vet did in service. Indicates MOS or specialty such as infantry, combat medic (my MOS), awards including a Purple Heart, Silver Star with valor, etc. This is important as combat arm skills are a presumptive for direct enemy engagement. For other military skills, VA requires additional "proof". More on that in a bit.
- 21-686c. Dependent information. Hey, include it with the original claim. Any ratings 30% or higher allow for extra \$\$\$. MUST have marriage license(s), divorce docs-if any for both, children's dates of birth, birth certificates, and SSN's for each individual.
- 21-0871: This is the most important form to have completed- in detail! This form allows for dates of enemy engagement or any related "Stressor or stressors" that are the cause of any mental anguish. I always tell an individual that writing about those buried memories is not easy, is not pleasant. However- by describing in as much depth as possible for one or several incidents allows for some VA person to become so very aware of how deep a vet is suffering. There is nothing in the world that will erase what we saw, what we had to do. To be honest, no matter the rating, no matter the money - we will take those memories with us. Yet, whatever money does come along, we can make our lives and the lives of those we love just a little bit better. Any veteran with any mental health condition -has earned that.

More on supportive statements. These need to be clear, as much detail as possible,

names and ranks of those killed or injured, what a vet saw or did. I always advise to

Okay, granted- I do get wordy! Yet detail counts. A couple of more "by the ways". First, a first claim for any medical condition will necessitate a VA compensation examination with a VA doctor. Many vets submit DBO's (disability benefits questionnaires) with a first claim. VA is under no requirement to accept those- not for a claim to establish service connection. Once service connection is granted- then VA is more lenient. Second- so very important – if a vet is currently under the care of a mental health professional, GREAT! The vet should include all private medical records associated with the claim. VA medical records will be acquired by VA. Just indicate which VA hospital has those records on the claim form. This establishes an existing, diagnosed medical condition. VA will still schedule a comp exam. That's just the way it is. DO NOT MISS THAT EXAM! Third- IF a vet is not currently under the care of a therapist- START! Fourth-VA will research all dates, names, etc. Again, that's the way it is.

Whew! Anyone reading this entire article deserves something- what, I am not sure. Perhaps if I attend this year's reunion in Vegas, a round on me. Get me before I hit the tables though- I suck at gambling.

Fellow vets- none of this is easy. Do not submit any claim on your own. Seek the assistance of good VSO's. VSO's exist to assist you with your claim.

2019 Election

Three positions will be up for election this year during the General Membership Meeting held Saturday morning, August 24th, during the 2019 Reunion. **The three positions are Vice President, Treasurer and one Director.**

The Vice President and Treasurer will serve two-year terms. The Director will serve a three-year term. All terms will begin January 1, 2020.

Candidates for Treasurer must have verifiable experience in accounting and/or finance. Excellent skills in using Microsoft Excel are required. Most importantly, the Treasurer is accountable for maintaining accurate financial records, preparing reports, budgeting, forecasting, etc., of the General Fund, the organization's investments, and all expenses and obligations incurred from the various projects supported by the 11th ACVVC.

The Directors are expected to commit themselves to a specific area of interest within the 11th ACVVC or as directed by the President.

Nominations for these positions should be submitted in writing to the Secretary or submitted from the floor at the General Membership meeting. Please consider participating on the Board of Directors serving the 11th ACVVC.



Meet the Officers of the 11th ACVVC

ichael Dean Rafferty was born in Lansing, Michigan on September25, 1946. He attended public schools in Lansing through the 12th grade. Then he enrolled in nearby Michigan State University and completed a Bachelor of Music degree in 1968. After completing work on a Master of Music degree at Ball State University, he was drafted in July of 1969. Since he had requested and received conscientious objector status from his local draft board, he was sent to Ft. Sam Houston for Basic and AIT. Upon arrival in Nam in early December, he was assigned to the 11th ACR and after meeting Dr. Collins, the 2nd Squadron Surgeon, was sent out to the field to join G troop. Mike spent the next six months as a platoon medic with G troop. In June of 1970, he was assigned to the 2nd Squadron firebase aid station to assist the squadron surgeon, Dr. Spurgeon. He spent the last two months of his tour in Dian at the aid station working for Dr. Spurgeon.

After his return from Vietnam, Mike had attained the rank of Spec. 5 and was sent to Ft. Lewis, Washington to work in the main aid station. He was discharged from the Army in July of 1971 and decided to return to Ball State University to continue his music studies in the fall. It was there that he met his wife, Elaine, who was working on her Master of Music degree. They were married in Independence, Missouri on May 28, 1972. Since their wedding, they have lived in Muncie, Indiana; Chicago, Illinois; Albuquerque, New Mexico; Kansas City Missouri; and Las Cruces, New, Mexico. Mike and Elaine have two sons. Alan is a cellist in the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra and Patrick is a Vice President and Senior Program Manager for a large French bank. 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DEFINING MOMENTS

matter how ve're in, no than they used to be, especially when I think about the war in Vietnam.

The veterans of the Vietnam War are not young anymore, No matter how good of shape we think we're in, no matter how hard we push ourselves physically to stay fit, the truth is our age is catching up with us, albeit more quickly (or slowly) for some. While in our own minds we may think we are as tough and capable as we ever were, our bodies remind us we aren't quite as fit as we used to be, and our memories are not quite as sharp about some things, while curiously remaining crystal clear about other events in our lives regardless of how long ago those memories were made.

As we get older I think we share a common experience that sometimes we reflect on memories that seem to persist as fresher, and more intense than any of our other memories. These memories are often of defining moments or turning points in our lives. These are memories of events that are so intense and so profound they have left a forever indelible impression on our lives and psyches, and forever changed the course of our lives. We recognize these memories as so significant they bear special remembrance of things that changed our lives, some in a positive way, or even some in a negative way. Even now some of these distant memories are so powerful they evoke an upwelling of emotion we are barely able to contain.

As I age I find that my memories and emotions are triggered a little more easily than they used to be, especially when I think about the war in Vietnam. I confess I don't fully understand that. I'm not sure why Vietnam seems to be the most defining, memorable turning point in my life. It's not that I don't have memories of other significant and even pleasant events in my life, I just find that my memories of incountry remain closer to the surface than any of my other memories. It's like there has been no time lapse between then and now.

I went off to the war in Vietnam fully expecting not to survive. I had volunteered for the military and volunteered to go to a combat zone. Once in country I attempted to volunteer for more hazardous assignments only to be told I was more valuable in my assigned job. I was prepared not to

survive. I accepted the idea that I was going to die in a far-away place. I welcomed the prospect of ending the suffering I had experienced as an orphan, and an outcast of my extended family. As a ward of the court by the time I was ten-years old I had lived in five different homes. My mother had died, and my father had abandoned me. I thought I had nothing to live for, no future. Certainly nothing in my life up to that point had resembled a normal childhood. Effectively I felt didn't exist. I was pretty sure that if I died in Vietnam it would hardly matter. I had no strong relationships to sustain me, my church had shunned me because of my involvement in the war, and I really had nothing positive to come home to. I had been mediocre at best in high school and I had already flunked out of college. I thought I was in love, but while I was in-country my girlfriend cheated on me (how many of us chanted marching cadence to "Jodie" in basic and AIT ?). I had no job prospects, no real family support, and nowhere to live even if I survived and made it home.

But sometimes a single event can intrude and totally upend your reality. Perhaps a moment of sudden fear can cause an epiphany that blocks out the perceived terror of the moment and provide a clarity of vision that shows you a crystal clear picture of what is happening in your life, and where your future should go. It can become a turning point in your life. You suddenly realize that you can overcome the fear of the moment, forget self doubt, and become motivated to overcome not only the adversities of the present, but reveal a confidence that you will overcome future adversities as well.

Vietnam upended my reality. My defining moment happened about a week after I completed Newbie school at Dian base camp. On bunker guard for the first time, I got my first taste of abject fear. We started hearing mortars in the distance, sounding as if they were moving toward our perimeter (they weren't). Suddenly I imagined sappers (who incidentally weren't there)

coming towards our section of the perimeter. Staring hard into the darkness at the concertina wire directly to our front I could just make out hints of movement in the wire. Scared, but ready to fight, I popped a flare to light my field of fire, only to discover that the movement that had instilled such fear in me was merely the remains of old flare parachutes caught up in the wire. I felt like a dumbass. However, in that moment I realized that had I not flunked out of college, I never would have been in this situation. It only took that one near paralyzing moment of fear (no matter how irrational at the time) to change my perspective and instill in me a drive not only to survive, but to return to the "World" and turn my life around. You've no doubt heard the old adage that there are no atheists in foxholes. Despite the fact that my faith had all but deserted me prior to deployment, I swore to God that if he would get me out of Vietnam alive and well that I would go back to college, get straight A's, and make something out of my life. I kept my promise (mostly). So here we are nearly 50-years later. When I read the 11th AVCC newsletter every quarter I am struck by the increasing number of our brothers that await us in Fiddler's Green. Like you, even though we aren't young anymore I'm not willing to acknowledge that I am on the "downhill" side of life. We can say that age is just a number, but the real truth is that we are much closer to the end of our lives than the beginning. That's OK though. We don't need to dwell on it, or be afraid of it, and it's no reason to climb into our favorite chair and wait to die. We need to press on. We need to recognize the value of the time we have left and choose to continue to experience the very best life has to offer while remembering so many are so much less fortunate than we are. We need to bear witness and honor the memories made so long ago, and recognize the positive as well as the negative impacts the war had on our lives. It was a turning point in all of our lives...

The Glory is in the Quest

On the 6th of June, American patriots will celebrate the 75th anniversary of D-Day; the Normandy invasion that penetrated the impregnable North Atlantic Wall and served as a portent of our victory in Europe. It is hard to imagine that a 20 year old lad in 1944, who survived that invasion will be 95 years old on June 6, 2019. A very small percentage of those men will be around to celebrate that invasion and that victory this year. But of those who are still with us, and of those who hit the beaches of Normandy that day or landed by glider or floated to earth via parachute in the fields near Sainte Mere-Eglise, few believed it was a victory that day. For them war indeed was hell, and their quest was survival, their goal was victory.



On 19 March of this year, coming back from North Carolina through Central Virginia, I took my brother-inlaw to see the D- Day National Memorial in Bedford, Virginia. Bedford is a small town just below the Peaks of Otter of the Blue Ridge Mountains that has a somber distinction. Joe and I took a back country road, a Virginia By-way that meandered along rocky ridges, across swollen streams to climb up one side of a mountain only to slide quickly down the other.

Joe Rizzo (my brother-in-law) was driving and was a bit perturbed with his navigator (me). To his frequent question as to how much further and where is this place, I could only answer: "keep driving Joe, the glory is in the quest." When we got there and viewed the memorial and landscaped grounds, read the myriad plaques and heard the stories of the Bedford Boys, it really was a story of courageous young men, a community that nurtured them and, of a nation that was to glory in their triumph.

On the morning of 6 June 1944 there were 44 soldiers, sailors and airmen from the town and county of Bedford, Virginia massed off the shore of Normandy, bobbing in the English Channel. Thirty-seven of these young men were assigned to Company A of the 116th Infantry Regiment, 29th Division. On that day 31 of them loaded into landing craft and were in the first wave to hit Omaha Beach. Five were blown from their landing craft, 20 were killed on the beach and four others were wounded in a matter of minutes. In comparison with its 1940 population, Bedford suffered the nation's severest per capita D-Day loss. From the small town of Bedford, Virginia of those who participated in the Normandy invasion, only two came home.

Vietnam veterans have and will continue, to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Vietnam War. Some of us even have a lapel pin or coin to acknowledge our quest for victory or survival in that war. Like the city of Bedford, our token is but a reminder of a somber distinction. We found no glory in victory, but only glory in our quest.

Not too many days from now, we will be observing Memorial

Day. We will be remembering our fallen, both those who died in "the Nam" and those who have left our side since. This year that observation will take place on the 27th of May and a significant number of troopers from the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment will travel to Washington, DC to salute our honored dead and each other. We continue that glorious quest.

Most of those gathering will be the veterans of Vietnam and Cambodia who regularly gather on the National Mall a little north and east of the Lincoln Memorial. They will be accompanied by some of their family members, and are often joined by former Blackhorse Troopers who stalwartly stood in a thin line facing the might of the Soviet Union in the canyons of Fulda Gap and even by active duty soldiers who received their baptism of fire in the sand pits of Southwest Asia.

It is always a surprise as to who, and how many, show up early each Memorial Day morning in the shadow of "The Three Grunts." Beside our guys who come from as far away as California or from deep in Florida, or who venture an early morning 4 hour drive from a Central Pennsylvania farm, we are joined by family members of our KIA's and of our gallant survivors, for-

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mer nurses - who with soft hands, warm hearts and beautiful smiles cared for us at the Blackhorse Base Camp hospital. We have even hosted a multi-decorated hero of the 11th Armored Cavalry of World War II who also held the posts of the United States Ambassador to Luxembourg and the Netherlands. More often than not, we also have at each of these gatherings a retired general or two, former colonels of the regiment and even a number of men who were to be named a "Colonel of the Regiment."

That happens - the gathering that is, again each Veterans Day and in recent years, on the birthday of the 11th Cavalry Regiment, when we formally and solemnly lay a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery. Few would believe, especially those familiar with obnoxious traffic in the Washington DC area, that so many would return year after year like on a pilgrim's quest just to be with their Blackhorse brothers and to pay homage to their fallen comrades.

And you do it also in other places around the country; at our annual reunion and when you present yourselves at the wake or funeral rite of a recently fallen Trooper. The pride and comfort you bring to the surviving family members is priceless. The joy and satisfaction you will know, or have felt deep in your gut, is eye-watering.

What is our Quest? In its pursuit, how do we find Glory?

Our quest? It is to seek out each other because we were proud to serve in a special unit; with competent, caring, loyal and trustworthy men. We didn't know at the time just how good we had it, or why it would be called – the Legendary Blackhorse Regiment. It took us some years and a lot of encouragement from the greeting of so many of our fellow warriors that we've met on the streets. It seems to never fail that a fellow Vietnam veteran or a family member of a warrior, spotting our red, white and black patch will stop and say thanks ... or more likely, "you saved my derriere." It wasn't me, it was you and all the Blackhorse troopers who served in Vietnam from 1966 to 1972.

As an example: this month on the 2nd of March in Monument Valley, Arizona a Navajo Tour Guide saw the 11th Cav patch on my hat and greeted me - "Blackhorse." His uncle, who has passed, served with us in '67; on Sunday the 10th in church, a former Engineer officer and retired Army veteran, saw the lapel pin and stopped to tell me how his "Rome Plow" unit was chased and pinned down in 1967 by an NVA company, before two Blackhorse tracks arrived to blow them away. It happens every time I walk the bridge from Arlington Cemetery to the The Wall. Some former soldier wearing another unit's pin or patch will salute me and say "Thanks Blackhorse" you came to our rescue.

We have yet more quests to pursue and a final one to secure. I found a summation on my computer screen recently: "A doctor can save your life, a lawyer can defend your life, a soldier can give you a peaceful life, but only God can give you everlasting life." Amazing. Our Quest for Glory; never thought it was that simple.

SALUTE TO HONORABLE MEN AND WOMEN

OCS Profiles: Bill Suhre and Thomas McGarrity

Often the bonds between war buddies are eternal. Such is true for these two Vietnam veterans, Suhre and McGarrity. The heading from The Greeley Tribune written by Mike Peters reads, "Bill Suhre stands in his Greeley law office Saturday in Greeley. The decorated Vietnam veteran was awarded the Bronze Star (w/V) for saving the lives of his fellow soldiers under fire and trapped in a bombed, burning vehicle. Suhre recently received a letter from one of the men he saved. He thought the man had later died of his injuries."

It is my decision to share the entire article for this chapter on the effects of how a letter brings back memories and emotions that are deep seated and better spoken to readers by the staff writer, Peters, and the direct quotes from the two veterans.

It takes a lot to make combat veterans cry. They are tough guys who have seen the worst. But when he got the letter, Bill Suhre – combat veteran, Vietnam vet, Purple Heart winner – admits that maybe he cried a little. Addressed to Suhre, who is a Greeley attorney and retired veteran, the envelope looks like it was addressed with shaking hands. It came from Griffithville, Ark, a place Suhre couldn't recall. Because of the shaking hands that wrote it, the letter was difficult to read, but Suhre took the time. It was from Thomas McGarrity, who wrote that he has Parkinson's disease and

it's difficult, "but I felt compelled to try and write the letter." And McGarrity told the story.

"On May 4, 1968, I was TC (tank commander)... that was hit with an RPG (Rocket Propelled Grenade). All in my vehicle was wounded, my driver the worst. I was hit with 128 pieces of shrapnel."

McGarrity explained how the vehicle continued to take fire from enemy soldiers hidden in the jungle.

"When I came to, you were coming to me and pulled me back behind the vehicle. Thank God you were there!"

The letter made Suhre think back to those days when he was a young lieutenant and platoon leader in the 11th Armored Cavalry. Today he calls those days, "the best and most difficult of my life."

The event McGarrity wrote about was near Duc Hua, Vietnam. Suhre won the Bronze Star that day. The award reads, "Disregarding his own safety, Lt Suhre ran under intense fire to the disabled vehicle and carried the causalities to an awaiting vehicle for evacuation." It goes on to explain how Suhre then returned to his own vehicle and directed the battle. "I thought McGarrity was dead," Suhre said from his office last week. "He looked in bad shape when they took him away to the hospital. In those days, when the men were taken away injured, you never heard from them again and never found out what happed to them."

Be sure to let us know by marking the Registration Form where it asks, "Is this your first reunion?". Our goal is to locate as many, if not all, of those who served with the Blackhorse in Viet Nam.

If you are one of our Star Families, please be sure to include the name of the member who was the "Blackhorse Trooper", what unit he was with, when he passed, and what relation you and your guests are to him.

OK, Registration Forms. Let's begin with the page on which the Registration Form is printed. "PLEASE DO NOT" cut or trim this page down. Send in the whole page! When I receive the forms, I record the information from it onto the web-site. I then place all the forms into a 3-ring binder which is used as a reference at the Reunion itself. After the Reunion that binder is used for future references and is put in the bookshelf that I have for all the past Reunions that Barb and I have done. So, you see having the whole page makes it easier to punch the three holes and file into the binder.

When mailing in your Registration Form please use one of the many address labels you receive in the mail. They really do make a difference, by having the correct spelling of your name and where you are from sure makes my job a lot easier. As we get older our handwriting seems to get harder to read. And my eyes aren't as good as they use to be.

When you register for the reunion on the 11thACVVC website we get that form right away and we can process it. When you mail your Registration Form to Ollie it may take a week before I receive it. As soon as I get them, I will put all the information on to the web-site under who is attending the reunion. When I do get them posted on the web-site and if you see somethings wrong with your name, whether it be a spelling error or under the wrong unit please call only me. I am the one who is

responsible for making any corrections on the list on the website. My home ph.# is 608-372-5892 or send me an e-mail with the correct spelling or correct information, my email is gtroop-bob@gmail.com.

I have had several calls from Troopers asking if it was alright to bring a "friend" with them. Of course, it is, just remember that they too must preregister and pay the full Registration amount. When you list your guest on the Registration Form and if they are from a different State or City please place that next to their name on the Registration Form. I will put this information on their name tag. However, all your guests will be listed with your City and State on the web-site. This will help keep you all together on the web-site list. Remember to register your service dog (no fee). Please always wear your name tag during the Reunion.

Your meal tickets are located behind your name tag. They are color coded for the type of meal you have chosen for the Banquet for Saturday night. The Red is for Beef, Yellow is for Chicken, the Green is for Veggie and the Purple is for Fruit. Chose only one per person, all Chicken and Beef meals come with veggies and/or potato. When you find your table and your seat you need to put your meal ticket on the table in front of you. This will let the server know what plate to bring you. The meal count is turned in to the Chef as soon as possible and can't be changed so please if you need to change your choice get with someone else who would like to trade theirs with you.

Your name tag has your Name, Unit, Date you were with that Unit in Viet Nam "or Guest" and the City and State you are from. The Unit on your name tag is the Unit you and your Guest will be sitting with at the Banquet on Saturday night. Please don't sit with another Unit during the Banquet, all seats are set by the count that you all have given us.

If you are not sure if you can make the Reunion and won't know until we get closer to the date of the Reunion, please register any way. If you find you can't make the Reunion you can cancel and your money is refundable. We (Ollie Pickral or Bob Moreno) must receive (by phone or mail) your cancellations by the 12th of August for a full refund. The 13th of August is the date that we turn in the count to the Chef for the meals and we are then committed to paying for those meals. The hotel is filling up fast please make your reservation for the hotel as soon as you can. If you need to cancel your hotel, the cutoff date is August the 5th for a full refund.

Last year we had a 1st Time Trooper who came only for the Banquet. The Registration desk was closed when they got there. Reunion Assistance Fund

Ollie Pickral, 11th ACVVC Treasurer

The purpose of the Reunion Trooper and KIA Survivor Assistance Fund is to assist Troopers who served with the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment in Vietnam and Cambodia, and family members of our troopers killed in action in Vietnam and Cambodia, to attend a reunion sponsored by the 11th ACVVC. Qualified applicants will be given one or more of the following items, depending on the number of requests, funds depletion, and the degree of assistance required:

- 1. A hotel room for one or two nights during the reunion weekend.
- 2. Transportation funds for fuel for auto, airfare or bus/train tickets
- 3. Registration fee.
- 4. Meals or food allowance.

Funds are collected through direct donations by our members and are accounted for by the Treasurer. The Trooper and KIA Survivor Assistance Fund is a separate account and published in the 11th ACVVC financial reports.

To be considered for financial assistance from the fund to attend a reunion of the 11th ACVVC, the Trooper or the KIA's immediate family members (defined as parents, siblings, children, widows) making the request must:

1. Do so in writing to the Secretary or the President, and 2. Provide evidence of the Trooper's service in Vietnam and/or Cambodia with the11th ACR.

The applicant Trooper or KIA survivor should describe his/her need for monetary assistance, briefly stating his/her financial situation. In addition, the Trooper may be required to become a member, of the 11th ACVVC. The Officers and Directors of 11th ACVVC will decide by a majority vote on whom and how much assistance will be given to a Trooper or survivor of a KIA.

Requests must be submitted no later than to July 13, 2019!

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Reunion Assistance Fund

History: In 1989, the Officers and Directors of 11th ACVVC agreed there was a need for monies to assist our member Troopers in getting to a reunion. Prior to 1989, the organization received many calls for assistance directly from the Trooper needing assistance or from the buddy of a Trooper hoping to get his buddy to the reunion. It was decided in 1989 that during the meeting of its members, a "**passing of the hat**" for donations would take place. With those donated funds, the 11th ACVVC could assist in getting some Troopers who might otherwise not attend because of monetary limitations.

During the 2008 Reunion Members Business Meeting, the Board of Director proposed and the membership passed Motion 2008-0823A

to modify the definition and name of the fund to include immediate family members (Parents, siblings, children, widows) of our KIAs.

Purpose Statement: The purpose of the Reunion Assistance Fund is to assist, if requested, Troopers who served with the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment in Vietnam and the Kingdom of Cambodia, and Survivors of our Troopers Killed in Action in Vietnam and Cambodia, to attend a reunion sponsored by the 11th Armored Cavalry's Veterans of Vietnam and Cambodia. Qualified applicants will be given one or more of the following items, depending on the number of requests, funds depletion, and the degree of assistance required:

- 1. A room at the host hotel for one or two nights during the reunion weekend.
- 2. Funds to purchase fuel for auto, tickets for airfare or other means of transportation such as bus fare or train fare.
- 3. Registration fees.
- 4. Meals or food allowance.

Maintenance of Funds: Funds collected through direct donations or the "passing of the hat" at the annual membership Business Meeting shall be maintained and accounted for by the Treasurer. The Treasurer shall include the Assistance Fund as a separate reporting item on the quarterly financial report. The Treasurer shall dispense funds from this account as directed by the Officers and Directors of the 11th ACVVC.

Rules of Acceptance: To be accepted for consideration for assistance, the Trooper or the KIA's immediate family members (defined as Parents, siblings, children, widows) requesting financial assistance to attend a Reunion of the 11th ACVVC, must

1. Do so in writing to the Secretary or the President, and 2. Provide evidence of the Trooper's service in Vietnam and/or Cambodia with the 11th Armored Cavalry "Blackhorse" Regiment. *

The applicant Trooper or KIA survivor should describe his/her need for monetary assistance, briefly stating his/her financial situation (i.e., job, income, family, or other relevant facts). In addition, the Trooper may be required to show proof that he is a member, or that he is qualified to become a member, of the 11th ACVVC.

Recipients will only be allowed this assistance one time. Exceptions to the one time only use of the Reunion Assistance Fund will be addressed on a case-by-case basis by the President and the Treasurer.

Exceptions to the "one time only" rule will rarely be granted and will never be allowed in consecutive years.

*Note: If the request is made by a member of the 11th ACVVC he has already presented "evidence of... service in Vietnam and/or Cambodia with the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment.

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Sinise Receives AUSA Chapter's Inagural Donlon Award

The Association of the U. S. Army's Greater Kansas City Chapter recently recognized humanitarian, actor and philanthropist Gary Sinise's almost 40 years of exceptional support to veterans, service members and families with the inaugural presentation of the Colonel Roger H.C. Donlon Patriot Award.

The award honors Donlon as both the first U.S. Army Special Forces soldier to receive the Medal of Honor and its first recipient in the Vietnam conflict.

Donlon personally presented the award to Sinise before an audience of more than 370 veterans, service members and members of the Kansas City community who filled the Count Basie Ballroom of the Kansas City Downtown Marriott.

Friends for over a decade, the two shared a heartfelt embrace as Sinise received the framed U.S. Special Forces insignia carved in Brazilian Cherry wood, with stiletto, set on the red field of the 7th Special Forces Group.

The turnout was tremendous and provided proof of the great esteem held for Donlon and Sinise by both local veteran and civilian members of the community.

Their personal friendship helped make the inaugural presentation of the Colonel Roger H.C. Donlon Patriot Award highly memorable.

Donlon retired from active duty in 1988, and following his distinguished military career has ceaselessly volunteered his time and energies in supporting the nation and his community.

As a captain on July 6, 1964, Donlon led his 12-man Special Forces team alongside 300 South Vietnamese soldiers in successfully defending the Nam Dong Special Forces Camp against a concerted, two-day attack from two Viet Cong battalions with a combined strength of well over 800 communist fighters. President Lyndon B. Johnson presented him with the Medal of Honor on Dec. 5, 1964.

Sinise, who played Lt. Dan Taylor in the movie Forrest Gump, is the author of Grateful American: A Journey from Self to Service, and continues giving back to those who sacrifice for our nation and encouraging others to do the same.

Sinise has committed his time and energy to veterans since the early 1980s, beginning with "Vets Night" free dinner performances for Vietnam veterans at the Steppenwolf Theater in Chicago.

Since establishing the Gary Sinise Foundation in 2011, he has led his fellow citizens in doing "all we can to extend our hand in times of need to those who willingly sacrifice each day to provide that freedom and security ... that we, as Americans, should never take for granted."

This is not the first time Sinise has been honored by AUSA.

At AUSA's 2017 Annual Meeting and Exposition, he received the George Catlett Marshall Medal, the highest award for service to the nation presented by the association.

Veterans No Longer Punished for VA's Errors

(Big Sandy, Mont.) – U.S. Senators Jon Tester (D-Mont.), John Boozman (R-Ark.), and Sherrod Brown (D-Ohio) introduced legislation to prevent the VA from charging veterans for its own accounting mistakes.

The VA annually sends as many as 200,000 overpayment notices totaling thousands of dollars to veterans and their families, sending them into crippling debt and withholding future benefits payments until the debt is paid. These overpayments are often a result of the VA's own accounting errors, but the VA puts veterans and their families on the hook for repaying the debt.

Tester, Boozman, and Brown introduced the Veterans Debt Fairness Act to reduce these overpayment errors and require the VA to hold itself, and not veterans, accountable for its mistakes. Their bill requires the VA to shoulder the debt burden of overpayments if the VA was responsible for the debt.

"It's wrong to put the debt from the VA's accounting mistakes on the shoulders of men and women who have served their country," said Tester, Ranking Member of the Senate Veterans' Affairs Committee. "For some veterans, these benefits make the difference

between paying monthly rent or missing payments, and we've got to stop the VA from pulling the rug out from under veterans and their families."

"Veterans rely on their VA benefits to make ends meet and shouldn't be penalized for the department's accounting mistakes," Boozman said. "Supporting veterans and their families by eliminating the potential for hardships caused by the VA's errors is important to honoring our commitment to their service and sacrifice."

"Our veterans sacrifice so much already to serve our country. They shouldn't be paying for the mistakes of the agency that's supposed to serve them," said Brown.

VA benefit overpayment notices have been steadily increasing, sometimes for a payment period dating back as far as five years. Many of these debt overpayments are at no fault of the veteran or their dependents, but rather VA accounting errors and record mismanagement. Currently, the VA can send out debt repayment notices to veterans requesting the full amount due within 30 days while freezing all benefit payments until the debt is repaid.

The Veterans Debt Fairness Act requires the VA to update its computer systems so veterans can update their own information regarding their beneficiaries, eliminating a key cause of overpayments. Under their bill, the VA would be required to offer electronic notification of debt notices, including information on how to file appeals and hardship waivers. Debt collection would have to adhere to a 5-year backlog time limit and no more than 25% withholding of benefit payments.

The Senators introduced similar legislation last year. Provisions of that bill were signed into law as a part of Tester's Veterans Benefits and Transition Act, forcing the VA to allow veterans to make changes to their personal information themselves. The backlog of these information requests were a main contributor to VA overpayments.

Cosponsors of the Veterans Debt Fairness Act include Senators Richard Blumenthal (D-Conn.), Debbie Stabenow (D-Mich.), Kamala Harris (D-Calif.), Elizabeth Warren (D-Mass.), Ron Wyden (D-Ore.), and Jeanne Shaheen (D-N.H.).

So for the past 42 years, Suhre thought McGarrity was another soldier lost in Vietnam. He never expected the letter from Arkansas.

McGarrity said he had so many injuries in battle that they flew him to a hospital in Japan, where he spent weeks and had his 20th birthday.

McGarrity also made a career of the military and was in for 15 years until he received a medical discharge in 1981. He drove a truck for years, then in 1992, a doctor found injuries from the Vietnam shrapnel, 24 years after the attack. He's now on military medical disability.

But he began dreaming about Vietnam last year, and he thought of the lieutenant who saved his life. "And then the Lord told me one day to write and thank him," McGarrity said.

Both men remember one specific incident in 1968 that makes them laugh to this day. McGarrity was on patrol and found a Vietcong tunnel. He radioed his commander – Suhre – to tell him.

I was from Arkansas and had a bad accent, and he was from New York and had a bad accent. We had a hard time understanding each other over the radio. Finally, the lieutenant just got in his jeep and came over to see what I was talking about."

But Suhre didn't have a hard time understanding McGarrity's letter.

"Just felt I should tell you," McGarrity wrote. "Thank you for all you did."

And Suhre? That tough military, ex-combat soldier, retired Colonel?

Well, he didn't want to admit it. But he cried.

While researching through volumes of articles, books, and resources to gather ideas and views on leadership, the above article best links to a description the "Armed Forces Officer" produced by the Department of Defense; Department of the

Army Pamphlet No. 600-2, Office of the Secretary of Defense, Washington which states under XXVII: "In battle crisis, a majority of Americans present will respond to any man who has the will and the brains to give them a clear, intelligent order. They will follow the lowest-ranking man present if he obviously knows what he is doing and is morally the master of the situation, but they will not obey a chuck-le-head if he has nothing in his favor but his rank."

Through the exchange between Suhre and McGarrity, the above proposition proves to be a truth for leadership. Suhre did what he as a leader was trained to do in battle crisis. McGarrity reached out to express his gratitude after years of silence. Neither of these honorable men fall into the category of "chuckle-head" relying on only rank to garner favor and trust from his troops.

It's official: Army approves 'pinks and greens' uniform on Veterans Day

The Army was able to straighten out its congressionally mandated notification requirements in time to announce on Sunday, Veterans Day, that the much anticipated "Army Greens" will indeed be your next service uniform.

Formerly known as the "pinks and greens," the World War IIera officers uniform could go Army-wide as soon as 2020, according to a release that was posted Sunday to the Army's website but was not shared through any of its social media channels.

"The current Army Blues Uniform will return to being a formal dress uniform, while the Army Greens will become the everyday business-wear uniform for all soldiers," the release said.

The new uniform will be "cost-neutral," according to the Army, though details of the budgeting plan were not immediately available.

Sergeant Major of the Army Dan Dailey told Army Times in September that while higher quality materials translated to a dollar-for-dollar more expensive uniform, the fielding plan would negate some of those extra costs in the aggregate.

For example, the release said, new soldiers will receive the uniform when they reach their first unit of assignment.

This, theoretically, would relieve the cost of issuing and tailoring uniforms for soldiers in basic training who end up dropping out, or whose weight fluctuates, requiring more alterations.

The uniforms are also expected to last longer — about six years, Army spokesman Lt. Col. Isaac Taylor told Army Times.

"We are purchasing a higher quality uniform with a longer service life, and we are executing a longer phase-in period to remain cost neutral," Taylor said, but he did not provide a price breakdown.

The standard uniform set-up will require pants and brown leather oxfords for both men and women. Women will have the option to wear a pencil skirt and pumps. Everyone will also be able to buy a leather bomber jacket as an outerwear option.

The rest of the Army would have until 2028 to pick up the new uniform, the release said.

Blackhorse Hoofbeats

Echoes from the Regiment's Service in Vietnam 1966-1972

Blackhorse Maintenance. Since time immemorial, cavalry sergeants have told their Troopers to take care of their mounts before they take care of themselves. For its first four decades, this meant taking care of their horses for the Troopers of the 11 th U.S. Cavalry. After 1942, it meant taking care of their vehicles and aircraft. Troopers heard over and over again that you didn't bunk down for the night unless your mount was ready to go to war the next day. Maintaining armored vehicles and armed helicopters was a neverending job in the 11 th ACR in Vietnam. Track block end connectors had to be tightened, air filters had to be cleaned, hydraulic lines had to be checked, and oil, fuel, and water levels had to be checked and topped-off as needed. Every day. Not whenever it was convenient. Every day. And under some pretty difficult conditions. As Tom Montgomery, the 2 nd Squadron maintenance officer in 1968, said: "Maintaining and fixing our vehicles and equipment was largely done in forward locations under pretty austere conditions."

And yet, the job got done. And not just done, but done well. Montgomery continues. "I learned how important these unsung heroes, our mechanics, were to the fight. They were tireless, proud and usually covered in mud and grease. Many of them kept extending, taking 30 day free leaves and returning to the mud."

At no time was the necessity of all this backbreaking work at the end of a hard day in the sun or rain more obvious than on 31 January 1968. That was the day every vehicle in the Blackhorse Regiment was needed to counter the massive Tet offensive against Saigon, Bien Hoa, and Long Binh. Firepower was needed, and it was needed RIGHT NOW! Leaving vehicles behind or, worse yet, having them break down on the only available road during the mad dash south was not a viable option. Colonel Jack MacFarlane (36 th Colonel of the Regiment), with justifiable pride, noted: "Your equipment's got to be in good shape. If it starts breaking down alongside the roads, then the columns start getting butchered up in a hurry ... There were very few dropouts on this particular move."

The 11 th Armored Cavalry Regiment was 'one of a kind' in Vietnam – a fact that was both a blessing and a curse. The curse was that the Infantry Divisions didn't have a clue what to do with the Blackhorse, and the logistical support units weren't prepared to deal with almost 450 combat vehicles and aircraft (and another 400-plus wheeled vehicles and trailers) in one unit. Higher-level mechanics were not trained to repair the sheer volume of tanks, ACAVs, self-propelled howitzers, armored bridges, flame throwers, command post vehicles, gunships, scouts, and slicks. And the repair parts system was overwhelmed within months of the Regiment's arrival at Vung Tau in September 1966.

Proof of this came during Operation Junction City in early 1967. Two squadrons operated full time in War Zone C for about a month and the repair parts delivery system broke down. Here's what Battle 6 (Lieutenant Colonel Ben Harmon) had to say about it: "Maintenance operations were characterized by considerable mine damage to suspension systems on the M-113 ACAVs and M-48A3

tanks. Repair parts for suspension systems were quickly used up ... Normal supply channels were utilized with unfavorable results ... Supporting Ordnance facilities were not geared to support large scale armored operations."

So, 'cannibalization' (taking a part from one broken vehicle to fix another) became a combat necessity. Such was the case when an ACAV from the regimental Headquarters and Headquarters Troop Scout Section broke down in the middle of a rubber plantation near An Loc in mid-1969. It's never good when you hear a "clanking thud" while driving an armored vehicle, but that was exactly what Sergeant Roy Johnson and his crew heard. Thinking that it might just be a thrown track, he and his driver, Specialist 4 Jim Meyers, dismounted to investigate. What they found was disheartening. The track was still in place, but the final drive yoke was broken.

So, there they were, in the middle of the rubber trees, many miles from Quan Loi, with dark approaching in about 4 hours. And, oh by the way, the regularly-scheduled afternoon thunderstorm was fast approaching, which would make the mud even deeper. Unlikely salvation, however, was just a few feet away. Remembering that they had just passed the hulk of a burned-out M-113 near the trail, they chose option B. Three hours of hard, sweaty, muddy work to cannibalize a yoke from the blackened hulk appeared preferable to towing the ACAV in the mud (option A). The whole scout section pitched in, either providing local security or turning wrenches. These resourceful Troopers made the best out of a bad situation and were underway before sundown.

Pilots and crew chiefs understood that if they didn't do their maintenance checks thoroughly, they wouldn't simply stop going forward – they would fall out of the sky, usually with unpleasant results. Both pilots and crew chiefs heard this mantra from day one of their training and a culture of maintenance awareness existed in the Army aviation community that was not always duplicated among tracked vehicle drivers and track commanders.

So, for the most part, young right-out-of-flight-school warrant officers and experienced 500-flight-hours majors, newby private first class door gunners and savvy staff sergeant crew chiefs alike, did their pre- and post-flight inspections and made sure things were as they should be. The attachment of the 398 th Transportation Detachment (Aviation Maintenance) to the Regiment from the beginning of its service in Vietnam helped to ensure the aviation maintenance system worked.

Specialist 5 Donn Kemp was an airframe repairman for the 398 th in 1969-70. He recalls that about 75 helicopters were shot down, blown up by incoming fire, crashed due to pilot error, mechanical failure, "or what not" in a year. He still believes that replacing the Huey chin bubble was the most difficult task. Some were broken when hitting something upon landing, some when the pilot pulled out his .38 caliber pistol and shot at a Viet Cong in the grass as he hovered overhead. There were 158 rivets on each side, all of which had to be drilled out, then new Plexiglas had to be put in place with clamps. New rivet holes were then drilled in the Plexiglas. He remembers many trips to the "boneyard" (military vehicle junkyard)

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to get Plexiglas chin bubbles and other parts when the supply system couldn't get them fast enough.

The resourcefulness of Blackhorse Troopers to address the short-comings of the maintenance support system in Vietnam is on full display in the following story (from a 919 th 'Red Devil' Engineer who wishes to remain anonymous).

The sergeant walked into the Long Binh depot office and asked for two 3/4-ton trailer tires. The clerk behind the counter asked for his

requisition paperwork. The sergeant said he didn't have any, but would be happy to fill it out on the spot. The lieutenant behind the counter, who had been listening to the conversation, noticed the Blackhorse patch on the sergeant's jungle fatigues. "Give him the tires", the LT told his clerk. "He's 11 th ACR. If we don't give them to him, they'll just come back tonight and steal them."
